OUR MISSION


Our Mission is to promote women's equality and access to education, employment, social and economic life.

Centre Overview

In 2015 Women's Centre Derry continued in its role as a key community development organisation, contributing to the social and economic regeneration of the City and the region. Capacity building and support services were delivered to organisations through our regional infrastructure programme partnership. The Centre also provided a range of education and childcare services to large numbers of women and families from many of the key social exclusion demographics. We have a sound track record in terms of our advocacy for women's' rights; the fact that the Centre is a women-only space; our fully-supervised, professional child care service, onsite for all of those women undertaking programmes at the Centre.

PROJECTS

Started in April 2015 the PROSPER 2 project promotes employment and women's empowerment through access to education, training and skills. A partnership between two women's centres, PROSPER 2 is delivered at Women's Centre Derry and Waterside Women's Centre. The project focuses on four employment related areas:

- IT/Digital
- Administration/Finance
- Care
- Creative Industries

The project activities are support by on-site childcare provision. This is an essential part of the project as it enables access for women with young children. Participants also had access to a range of support measures including 1-1 counselling services, job support activities and support with Maths, English and IT (see table below for year 1 outcomes and achievements). The PROSPER 2 project is supported by the European Union through DEL/ESF and DSD.

In 2015 the Child at the Centre (CATC) programme supported young mothers under 18 and babies in the 0-4 age group. Activities were held in safe, happy and secure spaces providing a good start for children in their very early years. Support for parents and babies in the early months and years is key for them in order to reach their full potential and excel as individuals.

A listening ear service ensures that young mothers have access to support and information to empower and encourage them in their role as mothers. The CATC project has built an excellent reputation and works to support referrals from health care professionals, community health teams and social support agencies.

Through this programme the Centre works in partnership with the Education Authority (EA) Western Region to deliver a School Age Mothers (SAM's) project. The young mothers engage in a peer support and personal empowerment programme which addresses self-care and improving personal strengths. Many of the mothers maintain connections with the Women's Centre after they leave school and continue to access support and peer connections for themselves and their babies. Many new faces are welcomed to the Women's Centre through the programme. Thanks to **BBC Children in Need** for supporting the **CATC** project.

In 2015 we delivered a successful Multi-Cultural Women's Programme. The project aims to:

- Increase the value placed on and encourage positive attitudes about cultural diversity and difference in our communities
- Build better capacity among BME women and children to be confident and pro-active about their rights, equality and cultures

The programme in 2015-16 supported women from BME communities, economic migrants, their families and communities, providing a welcoming space for women and children who are new to the City and finding their feet. The programme includes mentoring activities for individual women to support their integration and access. A big thank-you to **Derry City & Strabane District Council for** supporting the Centre, the Multi-Cultural Women's Programme and International Women's Day.

Live and Learn - 2015 was the final year of this five year project. Delivered successfully and collaboratively by fourteen women's organisations across the region including Women's Centre Derry. Below is an outline of the projects Impacts, Outcomes and Activities.

In 2015 we delivered (4) Health Awareness HAPI programmes of activities working in partnership with Bradleys Pharmacy. The sessions are informal and enjoyable, raising awareness about self-care, providing health checks and information about the services available through local community based pharmacies. It's a chance for women to share experiences, build confidence and exchange practical tips for looking after their health. Centre Overview

The **Centre's Crèche** and child centred programmes are a key part of our 2015 programme. Women's Centre Derry prides itself on our feminist model of delivery for education, training, skills and support for women. The Crèche is essential. Our services would not be accessible for mothers of young children without the childcare service. Open every day, the crèche focuses on the best interests of each baby and toddler in our care. In our communities many children in the 0-4 age group have no access to a quality crèche for play and early learning activities. This is due to the high costs of childcare and lack of provision for families who need these services most. At Women's Centre Derry the children enjoy a play experience in a high quality, safe environment. The high standards are thanks to the Crèche Coordinator and her team, the management committee and the support of our local Early Years Team. During the year we provided crèche services with a focus on safeguarding and on the needs of the child. We also supported parents and mothers attending courses. Staff and management accessed training in:

- Child Protection
- Hidden Harm
- Food Hygiene
- Promoting Positive Behaviour
- Leadership in Management CCLD
- Leading and Managing in Play Work

The Crèche Co-ordinator contributed to two group workshops for the Children and Young People's thematic group as part of Derry City & Strabane District Council's Community Planning Strategy. Thanks to **DSD/WCCF** for their continued support for the childcare service.

The staff and volunteers who meet and greet you at the Reception/Drop are the people who create your first impression of the Women's Centre. Your welcome will be a big factor in whether or not you join us and begin to participate in an activity. A cup of tea will be on offer from Carole and maybe a chance to meet some new people. Many thanks to the Reception/Drop In team, staff and volunteers for keeping a multiple of activities running smoothly and still managing the warm welcomes.

WISER (NI) is a community interest company (CIC) set up to develop social enterprise in women's innovation, skills, education & research. In 2015 WISER continued to develop and build sustainability for a number of programmes and services.

The CBCAB L4 Diploma in Therapeutic Counselling was delivered and a number of L2 and L3 programmes. WISER also delivered a number of recreational and support programmes. WISER supports access to counselling and support services by partnering with other organisations and agencies to deliver these services. In 2015 the project we worked with community based organisations throughout the North West enabling access for 164 people to 1-1 counselling support and services. WISER also supported the childcare services.

From feelings of isolation to connections, qualifications and purpose

I was extremely nervous the first time I came into the women's centre, I live in a rural community and found myself to be very isolated. I didn't know anything about the Women's Centre Derry before I came in and I didn't really know if I would be suitable for their classes.

In recent years I was diagnosed with a medical condition that was really difficult to control. I live alone and I was desperate to get back out into the world and engage with other people. The first step was to call into the Women's Centre Derry where I met with the amazing staff who took the time to talk and listen to me and find out what my interests were.

I decided that I wanted to sign on for 2 courses, the Book-Keeping & Accounts Level 1 and the Nail Art & Makeup class. These courses were polar opposites but I wanted to try my hand at both and I am thankful that I did. Yvonne and Julie are my tutors and they are truly amazing, both giving me great encouragement and guidance when I needed it the most. I was so nervous about the possibility of an exam and extremely anxious in the weeks leading up to it, both Yvonne and the staff at the centre talked to me and made the process a lot less intimidating resulting in me gaining a First Class Pass in Manual Book-keeping and Accounts.

I have made friends and my confidence has soared I even took part in an outreach placement at Older People North West which I thoroughly enjoyed and would do again in a heartbeat. My illness is becoming much more manageable and I am still attending classes at the Centre, my only issue now is What Will I do Next.....

I have made friends and my confidence has soared

From feelings of low self-esteem to ambition, achievements and empowerment

I left school at 16 with a GCSE in art. I studied Level 1 hairdressing at NWRC for two years and gained employment in a hair salon. After 15 years of working in a salon I had to give up work due to childcare issues. When I had my 3rd child my mother was diagnosed with cancer so my time was spilt between looking after my children and caring for my mother. I separated from my husband after 19 years so becoming a single mother was very difficult and I was in forced to move to sheltered accommodation.

My confidence was completely shattered my whole life had fallen apart, I didn't want to return to hairdressing and I

found that caring for my mother was very rewarding. A lady at the DHSS office recommended that I contact Women's Centre Derry to build my confidence and gain qualifications to enable me to change my career.

I came to the Women's Centre in September 2015. I was nervous, emotional, and quiet and I had low self-esteem. The minute I came through the doors I was welcomed into a warm, kind and friendly environment. Going to Women's Centre Derry was the best decision I have made and it was the best way forward for me. I signed up for Adult Social Care and I also gained qualifications in IT and Employability Skills.

My confidence has greatly improved. I am currently doing an adult social care placement with British Red Cross and WHSCT.

Returning to education has been a great experience and I wanted to show my children that you can achieve qualifications with hard work and determination. I am progressing to a Level 2 Safeguarding Unit, I am then hoping to gain part time work as an adult social care worker and then move onto an apprenticeship programme.

Women's Regional Consortium

For Women's Centre Derry, as a partner organisation in the Women's Regional Consortium 2015 has been a busy year. As part of the women's regional consortium providing specialist infrastructure support, WCD facilitated consultation focus groups, contributed to consultation responses and supported sustainability in organisations delivering services for women living in disadvantaged and rurally isolated communities.

We contributed to gender relevant policy & research, advocacy, and engagement on behalf of women. Throughout 2015 Women's Centre Derry as part of the Regional Consortium facilitated focus groups on government consultations, made written responses and contributed to reports. (see table opposite page)

Women's Centre Derry collected information and stats to support women's organisations in their efforts to maintain funding for frontline services. We collected baseline childcare statistics from WCCF funded centres and completed a 'WCCF sustainability, analysis and recommendations report '. The Women's Centres Childcare Fund has been key to the sustainability of services in disadvantaged communities throughout the region. In 2015 DSD completed an evaluation of the WCCF. This report highlighted a wide range of benefits and impacts which the WCCF has on the community. The evaluation evidenced that the WCCF childcare support addresses the needs of the most disadvantaged families combatting poverty, particularly child poverty. WCD works as part of the Women's Regional Consortium to ensure this support is sustained.

We have been active in support women's voices to be heard when shaping local policy by contributing to the Community Planning processes. Derry City and Strabane District Council is currently rolling out a comprehensive Community Plan for the area. WCD as a representative of the Women's Regional Consortium engages in all the Thematic Working Groups to ensure that the voices of women living in disadvantaged and rural areas are heard and articulated in development of the Community Plan.

In 2015, The Consortium partners worked together to link government & statutory agencies and women in disadvantaged and rural areas (D&RA) including groups, centres and organisations delivering essential frontline services, advice and support. The Consortium ensures that there is a continuous two way flow of information between government and the women's sector. It ensures that women's organisations, centres & groups are made aware of consultations, government planning and policy implementation and in turn ascertains the views needs and aspirations of women in D&RA.






