In everything we do we strive to:


- Deliver the highest quality person centred services which address the needs of women and families in disadvantaged and marginalised areas;



Overview 2018/19

The core of the Centre's ethos is women's empowerment and equality through access to education, training, skills and support. Below is an outline of the projects and activities delivered at the Centre this year.

PROSPER 3

The strategic aim of the PROSPER 3 project is to combat poverty and promote social inclusion by increasing the skills base of economically inactive and unemployed women. The project works alongside individual women to address the challenges and tackle the barriers faced in accessing employment. The activities focus on delivering employment and qualifications across four employment sectors:

- IT/Digital
- Administration/Finance
- Care
- Creative Industries

In the year April 18- Mar 19:

- 232 women participated on the PROSPER 3 project
- 184 qualifications were achieved.
- 190 women gained employment related soft skills
- 52 women progressed to further education
- 46 participants got jobs as a result of their participation in the project activities.

As part of the PROSPER 3 programme participants had access to 1-1 counselling services, 1-1 mentoring support, on-site childcare facilities, job application assistance and help to develop and update their CVs. PROSPER 3 is supported by the **European Union** /ESF, DfE, DfC and DC&SDC

2+

In 2018/19 period the 2+ project supported 41 children. The programme focuses on developing children's social skills and contributes to an equal start in education for all so that each child can reach their full potential.

Project staff attended training this year to ensure the best possible support for the children. Eager & Able to Learn training was very successful for us and the parents. We have implemented this learning into our setting. In the crèche I am displaying our "Daily Routine" and newsletters in different languages to make sure all the families feel included and welcome. I have been keeping in contact and have had visits from the Pathway Team ensuring the 2+ programme is as beneficial and successful as we go forward into 2019/20. Thanks to DE, Pathway Fund administered through Early Years the Organisation for Young People for supporting the programme.

VPRS

We delivered an informal English programme this year to contribute to the resettlement of Syrian Refugee families living here through the VPRS scheme. English classes were hosted on 2 afternoons each week. The programme is well attended and feedback is very positive. Participants have been steadily building their Reading, Writing, Listening skills. Now we have plenty of conversations in English. Women support each other to learn and to share information about the Derry area. A number of women have progressed to main stream English classes at the Centre. The Centre is part of a multiagency forum supporting this scheme locally and the forum has been able to help on many issues as the families settle in to live and work here. The VPRS project is supported by **DfE** and administered through Belfast Met.

Child at the Centre (CATC)

In 2018/2019, the CATC programme delivered activities to support children aged between 0 and 4 and young mothers. By providing a programme of joint activities the project delivers opportunities for shared experiences for mums and babies in their first months and years. Delivered in a safe, secure and positive environment the CATC programme nurtures and strengthens the existing bond between mother and child We contribute to improving the health of young mums and their children and we reduce the feelings of isolation experienced by many young mums in the community. The project also worked with the Education Authority (EA) Western Region to deliver a School Age Mothers (SAM's) programme which encourages young mothers to increase their personal, practical and communications skills, thereby increasing their chances of achieving in education, training and employment. The young mums engage in a peer support and personal empowerment programme encouraging self-care, improving personal strengths, building positive expectations, self-esteem and confidence.A listening ear service ensures access to support and information. The CATC programme has strengthened the centre's relationship with external organisations, health care professionals, community health teams and social agencies and has facilitated numerous support referrals. As they get older mums tend to stay in contact with the Women Centre. This ongoing contact means they have plenty of opportunities to continue learning and achieve their

full potential as individuals. Thanks to **BBC Children** in Need for supporting the CATC programme.

Health Awareness Promotes Inclusion(HAPI)

In 2018/19 we delivered the "Health Awareness Promotes Inclusion" (HAPI) programme to three coregroups of women and in collaboration with Bradleys Pharmacy. This year the HAPI programme supported young women and their children by delivering activities about pharmacy services and health-related topics such as:

- healthy eating,
- maternal and child mental health.
- stress and relaxation.
- health and safety in the home,
- fire-safety in the home,
- emergency first aid,
- financial support,
- sleep deprivation,
- dental health,
- speech and language therapy.

The project raises awareness about pharmacy services, provides a platform for women to share their experiences, to feel more confident in their abilities to care for their own and their child's health and to promote a healthy lifestyle for themselves and their families. Thanks to the Community Development & Health Network- BCCP for enabling the delivery of this programme.

The Shaping Ourselves and Our Children (SOOC)

In 2018/19 Women Centre Derry was delighted to host four **SOOC** programmes. Thirty-nine (39) parents participated on these innovative customdesigned cross-border parenting programmes drawing on Life Start specialist expertise & the specialist expertise of the Junction. The SOOC project is supported by the European Union's PEACE IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB). Match-funding has been provided by the Executive Office in Northern Ireland and the Department of Rural and Community Development in Ireland. The programme aims to support parents of young children in Northern Ireland and the border region of the Republic of Ireland to create a home conducive to good child social and emotional development, inclusiveness and a respect for social and cultural diversity. We host this programme in collaboration with the Lifestart Foundation.

Crèche 2018/19

In the year 2018/19 we welcomed (107) new families into our crèche and signposted (23) mothers to other agencies for further support. The Early Years inspection in September 2018 led to an excellent report. Training completed by the crèche team and management in the year is as follows:





CHILDCARE PROVISION 2018/19 (places)



16 Restricted funds

Derry City & Strabane District Council

This fund supports the Centre to promote social and economic regeneration in the DC&SDC area and to deliver programmes and services for women and families. The project also contributes to the implementation of the Council's shared future strategy by supporting women from minority ethnic communities.

BCCP - HAPI

This fund enables the Centre to work in partnership with a local community pharmacy in collaboration with their senior pharmacist. The project provides activities and information to increase awareness of pharmacy services available to help with health issues that are affecting mothers, babies and their families.

Big Lottery - Awards for All

This programme supports participants to progress and build on their skills. It encourages beneficiaries to set goals and make the changes they want in their own future development and what changes they would like to see in their communities. The project activities include opportunities for progression and a monthly engagement event for networking and information.

Childcare Partnership NI

Funding for the provision of ICT equipment.

Women's Fund for NI - Community Foundation NI Funding towards materials and books to participate in beauty course.

Dept for the Economy - ESOL NI (VPRS)

Funding awarded by the Dept for the Economy for Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme (VPRS) to attend English Language Training courses administered by Belfast Metropolitan College and funding for creche placements/nursery fees for attendees.

17 Designated funds

The income funds of the charity include the following designated funds which have been set aside out of unrestricted funds by the trustees for specific purposes:

Designated property funds

Designated funds is the value of unrestricted funds represented by the property at 5 Guildhall Square owned and used by the charity on an ongoing basis for charitable activities. The period end balance is equivalent to the depreciated historic cost of the capital expenditure. A sum equivalent to the depreciation charge on the building will be allocated to the designated fund each period, until it is fully amortised.
